FROM THE STREETS OF HAITI TO UCA

hen Jonas was 11 years old, he decided to run away. Living on the streets of Haiti was just too hard. He was hungry too often! So, he and his younger brother started walking. They planned to go to their older brother's home in the Dominican Republic. But as they neared the border, his younger brother decided to turn back. Jonas borrowed a shoeshine kit to earn enough money to send his brother back home.

When he got to the border, Jonas swam under it. "I had to swim hard and hold my breath for two and a half minutes," he says. He arrived in the Dominican Republic without a passport or visa and did not get arrested. "God helped me," Jonas says. "It was a miracle!"

The first night Jonas slept at an orphanage and gladly accepted the food they offered him. The following day he negotiated to borrow another shoeshine kit. This time he saved as much money as he possibly could so that he could buy his own kit. Once he had his

own shoeshine kit, he started walking again toward his brother's city.

Jonas did not know the way and was not able to read the road signs, so he followed the busses heading toward his brother's city. When he would meet tourists, he would offer to shine their shoes. Thus, he was able to purchase enough food to keep going. At night, he would seek out a place to sleep. Sometimes Jonas slept in a park. Sometimes a family would invite him to sleep in their house. On and on, day after day. Jonas walked.

Finally, after two months of walking, Jonas arrived at Santo Domingo, the Dominican Republic capital city. He knew he was close, but how could he find his older brother? Jonas decided to phone his mother to get his brother's phone number. When Jonas' mother heard his voice, she was so happy! She had assumed that he had gotten killed or kidnapped or that something terrible had happened to him.

When Jonas phoned his older brother, at first his brother didn't believe him. There's no way Jonas could have gotten past the border and traveled that far! Finally, Jonas convinced his brother that, indeed, he was close by, and his brother and sister-in-law came on their bikes to meet Jonas. It was a happy reunion!

Jonas went home with his brother, but his brother was not able to feed another mouth. Jonas still needed to shine shoes every day. Each day he would go to a different town. Sometimes he would be gone for several days at a time. One time when he returned to his brother's house, they were very mad. They had become frightened that something bad had happened to him and had gone out looking for him. They told Jonas, "You can't shine shoes in different places anymore!"

But Jonas couldn't stop working. "If I don't shine shoes," he said, "how am I going to eat?" Day after day,



Jonas shined shoes and eventually, he earned enough money to bring his mother to the Dominican Republic, too. He was so happy to see her! But now Jonas was responsible to not only earn enough money for his own food; he had to earn money to feed his mother, as well.

One day when Jonas was in Las Terrenas shining shoes, he met an American missionary family. He played with their child in the tree swing by the beach and when it was time to eat, they invited him to have pizza with them. Jonas ate until he was full. He was so happy!

When it began to get late, Jonas headed toward the park, but the American

family asked where he was going. "To the park for the night," he said. But they insisted that Jonas go home with them. "The American family liked me. I was different than most of the street kids. I was respectful and I would not steal from them." So, day after day, Jonas shined shoes and stayed with the American missionaries. Finally, after two months, he went back to his brother's home.

As he neared his brother's home, Jonas noticed that there were posters with his pictures on them all over town. He couldn't figure out why. But he soon found out! Once again, he had scared his family. His mother was mad and crying! Jonas promised to not be gone that long again. He didn't want to frus-

trate his mother... but how could he help her if he didn't shine shoes?

When Jonas told his mother that he had been staying with an American family who loved him like their own son, that they had fed him well and cared for him, his mother was very happy. The next day she went with Jonas back to Las Terrenas to meet the American family. "Mom asked them if I could live with them," Jonas says, "and they said 'yes'."

After that, Jonas would visit his mother every Sunday and take food to her. The American family enrolled Jonas in school. At first, school was very hard! He would study and study, and still fail the exams. He became very frustrated and told them "I hate school!" But they encouraged him to keep on trying, and he did. In fact, he tried even harder! Before long he began to succeed. His new family was very impressed with Jonas' determination.



Then Jonas' new American family decided to help him apply for a student visa. The first time they applied, his visa was denied. After that every day Jonas would go to the mountain and pray and ask God to help him get a visa; and on Sunday he would go to church and pray. Two and a half months later they went to the embassy in Port-au-Prince again, and this time he was granted a student visa, no questions asked! "God answered my prayer again!" Jonas says, "Mama Jaci (his new American mom) says it was miracle! So, I know God brought me here to UCA for a purpose. He must have something special in mind for me."

Jonas started school in America in grade 6 at the Peak School in Frisco, Colorado. It was a big adjustment—he had to learn the language, the culture, and catch up on a lot of schoolwork. Mama Jaci was afraid he'd get frustrated and do something bad, but that year he was voted "Best student in class!"

The following year Jonas skipped 7th and 8th grades and came to UCA as a freshman. Once again, he had a lot of schoolwork to catch up on! Now this is Jonas' fourth year at UCA. "Jonas has worked very hard," says Mr. Hartman, UCA's registrar, "the teachers have given him a lot of one-on-one tutoring, and he has overcome a lot."

Jonas confesses, "When I first came to UCA, sometimes I would find excuses not to do my job. Mama Jaci has talked

to me a lot. She has encouraged me to become a responsible person, to learn from my mistakes. She tells me that if I want to succeed in life, I must follow through. She tells me that if I do my part, my American family will continue to help me. So, this year I have been going to work every day."

Regarding Jonas's spiritual life, he shared this story from his early childhood: as the result of a VooDoo curse placed on him by his father's first wife, Jonas became possessed by a demon. For one month, he couldn't talk or eat. His mother, a Christian, would put soup in Jonas' mouth and every day she took him to the mountain and prayed for him. Eventually, the evil spirit left him. "This was another

miracle that God did for me!" he says.

Jonas knows from personal experience the importance of staying close to Jesus. He says, "I was baptized when I was little, but now, this year, I want to be baptized again. I want to be a better person. I need a start fresh. I'm only eighty-five percent close to God now. I want to be one hundred percent close to God."

Jonas wishes to publicly thank his American family for sponsoring him to America and to UCA. And he wishes to thank all the FoundationONE donors who also helped make it possible for him to spend these four wonderful years at UCA. He says, "UCA is exactly what I needed!"

Next Most Urgent Need – New Water System

For 76 years, the water tower has served UCA, but now, it is wearing out. The inside coating on the walls has worn away and the walls are becoming pitted. The maintenance crew has had to repair a few leaks, and the State Health Department has given UCA until 2025 to have a new water system up and running.

The proposed new water system will be a 500,000-gallon maintenance-free pre-stressed concrete water storage tank. It will be located northeast of the ball field at the highest point on campus. The beloved water tower near the girls' dorm will be retained for nostalgic purposes, but it will be retired from active service.

Total Raised to Date




Sidney Hardy, '95, Called to Mentor Young Leaders

was very awkward as a teen," Sid says. "My dad was the UCA Bible Teacher. The summer before my freshman year I was diagnosed with Burkitt Lymphoma, and my chemo treatments prevented me from beginning school on time that fall." Finally, in mid-October, Sid was well enough to join the 1991-1992 freshman class. He was a shy, skinny kid with a bald head.

Sid's body healed—a miracle story for another time! And he overcame his timidity—but the latter was a long, difficult process.

Toward the middle of Sid's junior year, his Chemistry teacher—Gary Thayer—the ASB sponsor, encouraged Sid to run for ASB Vice President. The idea seemed incredible to Sid, and he responded, "Well, who would vote for me?" Mr. Thayer replied, "Everyone! There's no one else running. Your student body needs you. You would make a great VP!" Sid decided to run and won! He was great at planning events



The fall following his graduation, Sid enrolled at Walla Walla University. He planned to major in religion and take the pre-med requirements. He said, "I couldn't see myself as a church pastor. I viewed church pastors as 'babysitters of old people', and that didn't appeal to me!" Therefore, Sid had decided to become a doctor and from that platform help people connect with God. Little did he know, but God had even more exciting work for him to do!

God led Sid, step by step, opening one door after another until his life work came into focus. After Academy Sid began working each summer as a counselor at Big Lake Youth Camp. This experience helped him to discover some of his interests and natural talents. "I loved presenting worship talks, and I enjoyed participating in drama. I realized that I was good at organizing and implementing things, and my heart was drawn to work with young people," he says.

His success at youth camp built up Sid's confidence and he decided to take a year off from college to serve as a student missionary. He accepted an assignment in New Zealand where he worked alongside a senior pastor organizing events for young people. That experience proved fulfilling too, and on the return trip home, a friend reflected to him, "Sid, you're not going to be a doctor, you're going into ministry." Sid was not yet certain, but shortly thereafter he changed from taking pre-med classes to taking education classes.

The summer after he graduated from Walla Walla, Sid married Zara Wooley, a young lady he had met in New Zealand, and he got his first job—serving as a school chaplain and youth pastor in a church in New Zealand. Later that summer Sid heard a presentation by Russell Burrell who was, at the time, Professor of Evangelism & Church Growth at Andrews University. Dr. Burrell asserted that the key role of a pastor is to equip the congregation. That idea resonated deeply with Sid. "Equipping is something I can do," he said to himself. "While I don't care to babysit old people, I do love the idea of helping members identify their gifts and equipping them for service."

Eventually Sid got a call to come back to America, where he continued his "equipping" ministry as the Associate Pastor of the Hermiston, Oregon church. Then in 2010, Sid got a call to come teach at UCA. For nine years, he taught history and Bible classes. Then three years ago the principal asked if he would be willing to devote full time to mentoring students spiritually. He accepted the challenge and became



UCA's Chaplain and Bible Teacher.

In senior Bible class, Pastor Sid teaches the students how to BE THE CHURCH:

- How to give Bible studies (they make their own appointments, prepare the study, interact with the interests, etc.)
- How to visit the elderly
- How to organize and acquire supplies to meet the needs of the community (food baskets & clothing for the poor, etc.)
- How to plant churches, etc.

The entire class is involved in implementing the above activities. Students help each other identify and use their unique talents and spiritual gifts. Every class member ends up getting the same grade because this is a GROUP activity, and everyone is expected to get involved in at least three activities. If a student seems reluctant or hesitant, it is the group's responsibility to encourage and involve that student.

Pastor Sid's Chaplain duties include organizing the Student Week of Prayer, Sabbath School, and Vespers. He coaches the students, and the students do the bulk of the work—the behind-the-scenes planning and the up-front



leading. They implement every aspect of Student Week of Prayer, Vespers, and Song Service for Church.

"The past few years, we have learned just how effective peer leadership is," says Pastor Sid. "When a student hears a testimony regarding how God is working in another student's life, the students really listen up! The past few years—since our students have been leading out in the spiritual activities on campus—we have seen exponential growth in the number of students desiring baptism. So far this school year (as of October 21), thirteen students have been baptized."

Yes, God's Spirit is alive and well on

the UCA campus! Our FoundationONE team praises God for the students God has reached through the equipping/mentoring ministry of Pastor Sid Hardy. May God continue to bless your ministry, Pastor Sid! Thank you for being willing to share your journey with our Connection readers.

After completing college, Louis got a job at the Ford Motor Company in Detroit, Michigan. "I've always been a car nut," he says, "I worked there for 39 years!"

Millie Durheim, '59, grew up on a dairy farm in Deer Park, WA. Her father expected a lot of his three daughters. At the age of 10, Millie was milking cows every morning before heading off to school. She also helped with logging and bailing hay and other heavy farm work. So, UCA seemed like a perpetual vacation to Millie. She loved living in the dorm, and she made a lot of friends. "I still keep in touch with several of those friends—what a blessing they have been to me through the years!" says Millie.


