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## **Executive Director Message**

While I was manning the FoundationONE booth at Camp Meeting in June, I had the most meaningful and moving experience of my first ten months with FoundationONE. # UCA? NEVER!

The following is an adaptation of a presentation given at the 2023 UCC Camp Meeting as part of "The Why of Adventist Education" Seminar that was organized by FoundationONE. The seminar audience was moved and inspired by the presentation given by Zetta Stam and her daughter, Landyn, a Class of 2023 UCA Graduate, and we felt our Connections readers would be blessed by it.

We have presented their stories in first-person voice, as though you are in the audience listening to them.

#### BECAUSE WE DETERMINED NEVER TO SEND OUR CHILDREN TO A BOARDING SCHOOL, UCA WAS NEVER GOING TO BE AN OPTION IN OUR HOME.

**ZETTA:** My husband attended Walla Walla Valley Academy, which is a day school, and I didn't grow up Adventist, so I attended public school. Since neither of us attended a boarding school, the idea of sending our children away at a pivotal time in their development seemed preposterous. Because we determined never to send our children to a boarding school, UCA was never going to be an option in our home.

Our two older children attended Lake City Junior Academy (LCJA) through elementary school, and we loved the Adventist education they received. But because we had decided against ever sending our children away, our two older children went to public high school.

The year Landyn graduated from LCJA was the first year of the LCJA/UCA pilot program—a program whereby 9th & 10th grade students would go to school at the now Lake City Academy three days a week, and two days at UCA. After much research and dialog, we decided to enroll Landyn in the pilot program. I'll let Landyn tell you the story from her point of view.

LANDYN: I am a planner. I love having a detailed organized plan, and my future was never an exception. Furthermore, Upper Columbia Academy was never part of that detailed plan for my future. I had gone to Lake City Jr. Academy for seven years and knew I wanted more of a challenge, but never thought it could be at UCA.

I then entered a college preparatory charter school, and had every intention of going to the Coeur d'Alene Public High School with all my friends from middle school. Towards the end of 8th grade my Mom told me she was going to an informational meeting about UCA. I felt a strange pull to go to the meeting and learn more. My biggest concerns and questions were quickly addressed and I left that meeting telling my mom I felt like I needed to go to UCA.

When I tell you I am the biggest home body ever, trust me on it. Boarding school sounded horrible! I thought it was just for the kids whose parents couldn't handle them and wanted to ship them off. Boarding school meant I was away from home, away from my family, away from my friends, and was taken out of my challenging educational environment. However, I entered UCA through the satellite program with LCA, and within two weeks of UCA beginning I was begging my parents to take me out of the satellite program and let me be a full time student. I am so glad my parents sacrificed a little



more time with me and let me be on the UCA campus full time.

This year I graduated from UCA after four very fast years. UCA has hands down been one of the biggest blessings of my life. It has given me tools to aid in my growth as a student, an athlete, a leader, and a follower of Jesus Christ. To be able to learn and thrive in an environment where your teachers are some of your best friends and mentors is such a unique concept in this day and age, and something I will never forget or take for granted. The staff at Upper Columbia are truly here for the kids, and fully committed to helping them become better people. The amount of flexibility I've witnessed since attending is truly impressive. From working around schedules to make it possible for me to take Junior and Senior classes early, to moving my schedule around so I could finish up flight school and go on to get my pilot's license, the staff were incredibly helpful and understanding. They understand life isn't always simple, and truly do all they can to aid in life's craziness.

I come from one of the most loving households you could ever imagine, and I have always been wonderfully loved and supported. I felt like getting outside of that bubble and transitioning to being on my own would be the hardest thing I'd ever deal with. However UCA was the ultimate transitional space. This school has given me the leadership abilities to thrive on my own, but simultaneously continued to be the support system I needed during the transition. UCA is a family. A loving, supportive, uplifting, connected family. And it's a family I will never take for granted. UCA is a safe place for so many students and truly becomes a home for them.

So even if mom gets a little sad when I call UCA my home once in a while on accident! — that truly is what it has become in my life and in the lives of so many others. I would never take back the past four years of my life and spend it anywhere else. UCA truly is a place to grow. And a beautiful one at that.


HELLO MY NAME IS

# Water For Life

When Gary Bartholomew was a child, his family hauled water from a spring across the river. Then his father, Bart, decided to solve the problem. He bought a cabletool drill and a wooden pole for a derrick, and he dug a well. When the neighbors heard what he had done, they asked him to drill wells for them. Thus ended Bart's bricklaying career!

Gary and his brother, Lynn, (UCA class of 1965), worked with their dad in the well drilling business. With the money they earned they helped to pay their UCA school bills. After graduating in 1967, Gary enrolled as a Biology Major at Walla Walla College (WWC), intending to pursue a career in wildlife management.

At WWC Gary drove the bus for student trips. On one of those trips, Gary noticed a beautiful young lady whose name he was too shy to find out, but whose face he couldn't forget. When he got home, he looked in the Mask and found that the lovely face belonged to Angie Edwards. Little did Gary know that one of Angie's friends had been telling her about the man named Gary Bartholomew. When Gary called Angie to ask for a date, he said, "You probably don't know who I am...", but Angie quickly answered, "Oh yes, I do!"

Gary and Angie were married in June 1970. Then Uncle Sam called, and Gary became a medic in the US Army. While in Maryland, their son Craig (UCA class of 1993) was born. In 1974 the family moved back to Spokane and Gary went back to drilling wells with his father. A year later their second son, Rodney (UCA class of 1995), arrived. The boys and the well-drilling business continued to grow.

In January of 1985 Gary and Angie adopted Rosie through International Children's Care (ICC). Little did Gary and Angie know how God would use the connection with ICC to be a catalyst for them starting a ministry!

Fast forward 12 years. Angie's uncle, Ottis Edwards (UCA class of 1947) was going to the Instituto de Capacitación Adventista del Petén (ICAP), a secondary school in Guatemala, to do some campus cleanup work, and he invited Angie to go with him. When Angie learned that ICAP was managed by ICC, she jumped at the chance to go!

Gary and Angie started going to Guatemala every year. These trips were better than a vacation for them. One year, Gary noticed that the Los Pinos Children's Village and ICAP school were pumping water out of the river to drink. It was causing problems. People were getting sick. Gary thought, "There's got to be a way to get safe water to these people.

Gary's first attempt to solve the problem was hire a Guatemalan well driller, but the driller just didn't have the proper equipment. After seven months of hard work, he had only gotten down 200 feet and all he was pumping was muddy surface water.

So, Gary put an advertisement in a well drilling magazine asking for someone to donate a drilling rig. One Friday night at 10:00 the phone rang. The caller had some equipment that he estimated would be good for fifty more wells. Eventually arrangements were made to purchase the rig and ship it to Guatemala. That rig is still in use today, and it has drilled more than 200 wells!

Using that rig, Gary and his team were able to find a safe and abundant supply of water for the kids and staff at ICAP and Los Pinos. They dug three wells one for the ICAP secondary school, one for the Los Pinos Children's Village, and a third one—a spare in case either of the first two wells developed a problem. Later, they drilled another well so both places would have a primary well and a backup well. The primary wells continue to function to this day. A UCA World Changer Story

Switching the water system over to the new wells produced an amazing miracle story. Gary and Angie's son, Rod, and his wife, Jennie, were working to set the pump in the new well. It was almost completed but they needed a few more parts. However, they were miles away from any supply stores and it would take 2-3 days to get the parts. So, they decided to go to the school shop to see if any of the parts happened to be there. To their great surprise, they found *everything* they needed, and they finished the job.

And just in time, too, for that evening they received an urgent call. "What will it take to get the new pump system going?" the caller asked. Rod replied, "We just need to turn the breaker on. Why the urgent call?" "The transformer that runs the two pumps down at the river (one pump for Los Pinos and for for ICAP) has blown up. Both campuses are completely out of water!" Rod went to the pump house and turned on the breaker. The new well was ready at the perfect time!

After those wells were completed, Gary and his team started looking around. "Look at all these nearby villages that don't have safe water," they said. "They also are plagued by giardia. Why don't we start drilling wells for these villages, too?"

Gary put an advertisement in a national water well journal. Since well drillers often take time off during the winter, the idea of going to Guatemala appealed to many kind-hearted and generous readers. Thus, people from many different religious faiths joined together to drill wells.



Since 2005 when Water for Life was established, nearly two hundred wells have been dug. They have gone from drilling three wells per year to approximately forty wells per year. And that number continues to climb as more workers are trained. It's not just well drilling that the workers are doing--they also maintain and service the pumps.

"When a well is completed, Water for Life conducts a dedication service," says Angie. "Sometimes the villagers won't let anyone use the water until the dedication has taken place. They'll even put a chain and padlock on the pump, and then they insist that Gary be the first one to use it!"

Gary and Angie began to think about how to share the "Water of Life" that Jesus gives. They hired eleven part-time Bible workers who they tasked with going into a village, buying property, drilling a well, and then building a church on the property. The connection between the well that brings water and the church that brings the "Water of Life" has worked very effectively.

When Gary and Angie began their work in Guatemala, there was one central church in Poptun, the town closest to ICAP and Los Pinos. Now there are seven churches. "We're building churches all the time," Gary says. "The Bible workers are keeping the pastors very busy baptizing people!" drilling wells," says Edwin Thompson, former ICAP director, "there was no way to talk about the Bible with the people in these remote villages. Well drilling has unlocked the villages and opened the hearts of the people toward the gospel."

Water for Life is not something Gary and Angie ever aspired to. "God has very interesting ways," says Angie. "We thought we would hire that driller to drill the well and the problem would be solved, but God had bigger plans."

#### The Encourager Scholarship



ony Henneberg was born in Nebraska, but when he was only three years old, the family moved to Curaçao, thus beginning many years of life in the mission field. The Henneberg family lived in Curaçao for three years, when his father got a call to move to Caracas, Venezuela, where he and his brother, Jim, began attending the local church school. Their instruction was in Spanish, and they quickly became fluent, a factor that would affect his career path in later life.

The family next moved to Bogota, Colombia, where Tony's father was to be the Conference President. However, there was intense persecution of Protestants at that time in Colombia. so three years later, in 1959, the family moved to Cuba. Little did they know it would be just months before Fidel Castro came into power. After two years in Cuba, Tony's parents felt that it would be best for the boys' safety to leave Cuba and go to school at Upper Columbia Academy. Tony entered UCA as a sophomore, and Jim a freshman. They knew very little English upon arrival. which earned them the nicknames of "Fidel" and "Castro". Both boys immensely enjoyed their time at UCA; Tony graduated in 1963. Tony felt very grateful he was able to grow up "overseas", and always assumed that he would someday be a missionary, too.

The first step in fulfilling his dream, Tony attended Walla Walla College, where he majored in Theology. He later attended the seminary at Andrews University. While at WWC, he met Bonnie, who eventually became his wife. Ironically, Bonnie wanted to be a pastor's wife, and said that she could never be a doctor's wife. Their first pastorates were in Washington State, and while pastoring in Bellevue, Tony realized that he just wasn't "cut out" to be a pastor. After praying about his situation and speaking with a physician friend, Tony believed that he would enjoy being a doctor, and went to medical school with the idea of being a family doctor. However, after arriving at Loma Linda, he was encouraged to become an OB/GYN. Glendale Adventist Hospital was needing an OB/GYN who could speak Spanish.

After completing his residency in Southern California, Walla Walla General Hospital tried to recruit Tony, but Pastor Henry Lamberton, invited Tony and Bonnie to look at the possibility of working in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. Tony interviewed for a position in Dr. John Cutting's practice, and thus began 40 years of providing medical care in Coeur d'Alene. They had Andrew and RJ there. Both boys have chosen to live and work in the Coeur d'Alene area. Tony and Bonnie were blessed to be close to their boys and eventually their grandchildren. Although Tony spent his career in the medical profession, he

always had a pastor's heart. His care and concern for patients, his ability to encourage and build people up, and his genuine love for others was evident to all who knew him.

Tony loved and supported Upper Columbia Academy throughout his life, and currently UCA is being blessed by the 5<sup>th</sup> generation of Hennebergs.

At the request of the family Tony's scholarship will be named "The Encourager" Scholarship. In addition to having a financial need, students will be chosen who are known to exemplify the attributes of encouragement, compassion, and kindness to others.

# "Igniting the World" CAMPAIGN

The Igniting the World Campaign is designed to address the most pressing areas of need at Upper Columbia Academy. As the campaign nears the end of its second year, it has become apparent that we need to clarify some guestions that continue to be raised. As the chart opposite illustrates, these needs are divided into three categories: "Education for the 21st Century", "Vital Campus Enhancements", and "Student Aid in Perpetuity". Under the first two categories there are several, more specific areas where funds can be designated.

On the ignitingtheworlduca.org website you can click on any of the blue, underlined headings, and find out more about that specific project.

Here are the answers to three of the most commonly asked questions:

#### "If I mark my donation for the Igniting the World Campaign, where does it go?"

When a donation is given to the Igniting the World campaign without any specific indication as to which category it should be applied to, 60% of the donation will be passed through to UCA, and 40% will be put in the FoundationONE endowment. The 60% that goes to UCA will be divided up proportionately based on the categories under "Education for the 21st Century" and "Vital Campus Enhancements".

#### "If I just make my check out to FoundationONE, where does the money go?"

Because FoundationONE is primarily focused on the endowment which produces ongoing student aid for UCA, any donation that isn't earmarked for the Igniting the World Campaign or some specific project at UCA, will automatically go into the general endowment fund for student aid.

#### "How do I make sure that my gift for the Water Towers, Girls' Dormitory or Faculty Home Renovations will actually go to the specified project?"

This is one of the most important questions we face in a campaign such as this. Our promise to you is that we will always follow the wishes of our donors. However, with so many areas of need, you must

#### NEW WATER TOWERS NEEDED URGENTLY

The most urgent need at this time is the replacement of the old water towers. The state has said that they are in imminent need of replacement, and the current water capacity of 240,000 gallons is well below the Washington State requirement for fire code.

Here is the projected timeline and budget for the building of the two new water towers, and the demolition of the current upper water tower. The lower tower will be left in place because of the iconic image it has been on campus for so many years.

#### THE PROPOSED TIMELINE FOR COMPLETION OF THE PROJECT IS AS FOLLOWS:

**July 2023**—Submit water system plans to WA State Department of Health August 2023—Initial Department of Health project approval

**September 2023**—Geotechnical work on the site for the new towers

**December 2023**—Engage Baker Silo to schedule construction

July 2024—Construct the water system

September 2024—Connect the new water system over September homeleave.

Project Budget—Two Cast-in-Place Concrete Reservoirs

Double cast-in-place reservoirs are required that are 26 feet in diameter and 75 feet in height.

The tanks would be constructed by Baker Silo, a firm from the west side of Washington State.

These tanks do not require interior or exterior maintenance.

#### **PROJECTED BUDGET – (ACTUAL COSTS COULD BE HIGHER)**

- \$15,000 Civil design of site layout, plans preparation, and bidding assistance
- **\$10,000** Geotechnical engineering report
- **\$70,000** Install 800 feet of 12" water main and 6" overflow/drain piping under the current driveway to principal's home
- **\$6,000** Install fire hydrant assembly
- \$770,000 Baker Silo constructs two cast-in-place foundations and reservoirs
- \$10,000 Install water level control equipment
- \$35,000 Repave driveway to the principal's home
- \$10,000 Demo the existing 200,000-gallon reservoir and two existing fire hydrants
- \$926,000 TOTAL

Members of the 1966 – 1971 graduating classes have joined together to help with the Faculty Home Renovations component of the "Vital Campus Enhancements". Headed up by Wes Brown, '68, there will be a team of volunteers on the UCA Campus from July 31 – August 10. They will be doing a variety of projects: rebuilding fences, painting fascia, tearing out a shower, remodeling a shower, and more. There is also an urgent need for an electrician who can help to change out a few breaker panels that are outdated. Money has been pledged for the materials, and we have an experienced volunteer who can do much of the work. However, we need a licensed electrician who could pull the permits and help with the project. We are very grateful for the money, time and effort that these class members have put in, and we pray for God to bless their team with safety and success.

## Maranatha International Blesses UCA

rom June 19 to July 5 the campus of Upper Columbia Academy was again blessed to have a team of Maranatha International volunteers giving of their time, energy and talents to make some much need improvements.

The two biggest projects this year were to repaint the stairwells in the girls' dormitory, and to replace the rafters and roof on a three-car garage.

The dorm stairways and handrails all had to be stripped of paint, and then re-painted with different colors for wall, handrails and steps – all of which was a very time-consuming task! When the team finished the stairwells, they found two other projects to do. The emergency stairs out of the girls' dorm chapel needed to be replaced, so sturdy new treads were put on, and all metal was stripped, primed and painted. The team noticed that the breezeway into the chapel was also in dire need of repainting, and the windows needed re-caulking. The garage project replaced rafters and roofing, and also installed access doors to each of the garages, so that if the power goes out, each garage is still accessible. Up until this time the only access into the three garages was through the large electric garage doors. As you can imagine, in labor costs alone, the Maranatha team probably saved UCA close to \$100,000.
